Please discuss your reactions to *At the River I Stand* with others at your table. Encourage everyone in your group to share their thoughts. Refer to the following questions and/or ask your own.

- 1) What does the film reveal about the connection between labor and civil rights?
- 2) Why was the statement "I am a man" so powerful?
- 3) Why and how did the broader community in Memphis become involved in the sanitation workers' struggle?
- 4) Why and how did labor leaders, African American activists and others around the country become involved in the sanitation workers' struggle?
- 5) Tensions over tactics (violent, non-violent, etc.) within social movements still exist. What lessons can we gain from the film's examination of these differences?
- 6) Do you feel that the issues raised by Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. in his last days have been addressed? Why/ why not?
- 7) The sanitation workers began organizing before they had the official support of the national union. What can we learn from this?
- 8) What does the legacy of the Memphis strike mean for your work within the UFCW today?
- 9) What can we learn from the Memphis strike in terms of the recent attack on public jobs and services?
